MICHAEL, I am proud and honored to nominate William Conner, ASTC, for Fellow of the Society. Bill meets all of the eligibility requirements in that he has rendered conspicuous service and made notable contributions to the advancement of theatre consulting.

Since 1987 Bill has unhesitatingly and exhaustively represented the ASTC – and the professional theatre planning community – to the US code making authorities. He is primarily responsible for the enacting of dozens of building and life-safety code changes that have brought common sense and good design to the industry. Some examples of Bill's influence are:

- Antiquated requirements have been eliminated, and new requirements developed that respond more accurately to contemporary facility design, such as: construction type; enclosure; allowance for trap rooms; openings in stage walls and floors; and special structures within stages.
- Numerous specific details have been deleted, revised, or added to accommodate contemporary practice and construction, such as special guard (railing) configurations, unprotected (i.e., non-fireproofed) structure; and limited used of combustible materials (e.g., wood catwalk decks).
- Development of clear, performance-based standards recognizing alternate forms of theatres and alternate strategies for life and fire safety, particularly as regards natural and mechanical ventilation and proscenium opening protection if the form of fire safety curtains or deluge water curtains.
- Recognition that, since the Iroquois Theatre fire in 1903, there have been no significant fires in performing arts venues while occupied by an audience, but that performers and technicians are often exposed to hazards. This addressed issues of backstage fire compartments and minimum degree requirements for technical areas.

Throughout all of this exceptional work, Bill has often had to battle entrenched influences by self-serving manufacturers and vendors, and he has steadfastly conducted himself with assurance and composure. He has also meticulously kept close communication with all ASTC members to gather member input and to keep the members aware of pending and completed code changes.

Recommendation of William Conner as Fellow of ASTC

I am writing to recommend Bill Conner to be the second Fellow of ASTC. While there are many reasons that qualify Bill for the honor of Fellow, I will discuss in detail only two.

First, is Bill's service to the Society for his work on Codes and Standards. After becoming an ASTC member, Bill sought to influence the model building codes in ways that would be beneficial to our profession. This was not an easy task. Bill sought advice from members of the building code panels and learned that to become credible. it took years of participation and work with the code bodies. Bill made that long term commitment, and followed through. In a remarkable short span of 3 or 4 years, the building code and NFPA people developed respect for Bill, and his ability to analyze a code problem and craft language that would address it. One of Bill's first assignments was providing input to the committee tasked with coordinating sections dealing with stages in the three model codes in use in the US in the early 1990s. As many of these meetings were held in Washington, DC, I was able to attend them with Bill and observe him in his representation of ASTC. Later in the 1990s Bill was part of the public assembly sub-committee for ANSI 117.1A (the ANSI standard dealing with ADA requirements). Again, as many meetings were held in Rockville, MD, I was able to attend with Bill and observe his unique ability to work with code officials, clearly explain our problems, and craft language that was acceptable to the many interests around the table and be code enforceable. For his code and standard work alone I would highly recommend Bill to be a Fellow of the Society.

However, in addition to the above, Bill is also a very fine and creative theater consultant. It was my pleasure, for twenty years, to be involved with a preventative maintenance program at Alumni Hall, at the United States Naval Academy. This space is a 5000 seat basketball arena that was mechanized to convert to a concert hall; a performing arts center capable of dance, opera, and road shows; as well as serve the unique assembly and academic needs of the naval midshipmen. Bill was the lead designer for this facility during its planning when he worked for Systems Design. His success in achieving a useable, functioning multi-use space on this scale is incredible and is testified to weekly (often daily) by the hall staff as they change the configuration of the hall to accommodate the variety of scheduled events.

I have also had the change to see recent examples of Bill's work and am always impressed with the simple and inexpensive solutions he develops to the problems that vex us all.

In summary, Bill Conner, should be an ASTC Fellow based on the quality of his consulting work and the service to the Society of his work on codes and standards. Each member of the Society, benefits daily in our work because of the code and standards work Bill doggedly pursued in the 1990s and early 2000s.

My partner in George C. Izenour Associates, Jim Read, and I both concur that Bill should be the next Fellow of ASTC.
